

J-1 Visa Guidance Sheet

I. Understanding the J-1 Visa:

The J-1 visa facilitates cultural and educational exchange programs in the United States. It's designed for individuals interested in academic studies, research, training, or experiencing U.S. culture first-hand. Administered by the U.S. Department of State, this visa aims to foster global understanding through diverse exchange initiatives.

II. Eligibility Criteria:

- <u>Sponsorship</u>: Participants must secure sponsorship through an approved Exchange Visitor Program. These programs range from university exchanges to specialized programs in various fields.
- Intent: The primary focus should be on educational or cultural exchange rather than employment. The program's nature should align with the participant's field of study or career goals.
- Financial Support: Demonstrating adequate financial resources to cover living expenses during the stay in the U.S. is crucial. Sponsors often require proof of funding.

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- <u>DS-2019 Form</u>: Once accepted, the sponsor issues the DS-2019 form- a critical document for the visa application.
- * <u>SEVIS Fee:</u> Pay the SEVIS (Student and Exchange Visitor Information System) fee before the visa interview.
- <u>DS-160 Form</u>: Complete the DS-160 form online and schedule an interview at the nearest U.S. embassy or consulate.
- Interview Preparation: Gather essential documents such as the DS-2019 form, passport, DS-160 confirmation page, financial proof, and documentation supporting the intent to return to the home country.
- <u>Visa Interview</u>: Attend the interview, answering questions about the program, intent, and readiness to comply with visa regulations.
- <u>Visa Issuance</u>: If approved, the visa will be stamped on the passport, allowing entry into the U.S.

V. Key Considerations and Responsibilities:

- <u>Program Duration</u>: The visa's validity aligns with the program's duration specified on the DS-2019 form. Extensions may be possible with sponsor approval.
- <u>Two-Year Home Residency Requirement:</u> Certain participants may be subject to a requirement to return to their home country for two years before applying for certain U.S. visas or permanent residency.
- <u>Work Permissions</u>: Depending on the program category, participants may have limited work permissions or restrictions. Compliance with visa regulations is crucial.
- * <u>Maintaining Status:</u> Participants must adhere to program rules, maintain legal status, and comply with reporting requirements throughout their stay in the U.S.
